## **ARE YOU RECYCLE READY?**

New recycling standards mean that the way we recycle is changing. The market is requiring high-quality materials. Paper needs to be clean and dry. Bottles and containers need to be empty of food and liquid. Only then are they in good enough condition to be recycled into new materials. The rest are sent to landfill. Make sure your blue cart is "Recycle-Ready:"



### Together we can make Palo Alto Recycle Ready!

Please follow these guidelines to ensure your materials are recycled:

- » Put only accepted items into your blue cart
- » Empty all cans, bottles, and containers
  - » Pour out liquids
  - » Scrape out foods
  - » Wipe out oily, sticky residue
- » Put only clean, dry paper in the recycling cart. Greasy, gooey, and grimy paper goes in the compost cart.

### **GREENWASTE HIGHLIGHTS**

- COMPOST CHRISTMAS TREES: For the four weeks following Christmas day, Christmas trees will be collected curbside. Trees must be undecorated, unflocked, cut to four-foot lengths with stands removed, and placed curbside next to your green compost cart.

## **ZERO WASTE HOLIDAY SEASON**



#### 'Tis the season for giving, not the season for wasting!

According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), during the period between Thanksgiving and Christmas, American household waste increases by 25%!

In the spirit of the holidays, we often buy more this time of year, and while our intentions are good, this can result in a lot of extra waste that ends up being landfilled.

If you are ordering your gifts from an online retailer, consider the amount of packaging that is required for shipping. Some retailers like Amazon offer "frustration free" packaging on certain products, which reduces the amount of packaging used, and ensures each

component is recyclable.

If purchasing gifts in a store, you can look for retailers that offer package free products.

#### **Additional Waste Reduction Tips:**

- » The EPA estimates 1 million tons of wrapping paper end up in the landfill each year! Look for wrapping paper made of recycled content, or better yet, forgo it for newspaper, paper bags, or scarves.
- » Opt for homemade gifts, or give experiences instead of material objects. Examples include: classes, museum passes or concert tickets. For more waste-free gift ideas, visit www.cityofpaloalto.org/zwholiday

» Air pillows and bubble wrap can be recycled. Remove the air from the air pillows, bag with other film plastics, and place in your blue recycle cart.

## SINGLE USE PLASTIC ON REQUEST ONLY

On September 20th Governor Jerry Brown signed Assembly Bill 1884, making California the first state to pass legislation restricting the use of single-use plastic straws. Plastic straws have become increasingly unpopular due to the harm they cause marine life.

A recent marketing study from the consulting company Technomic estimates that Americans use 172 million plastic straws per day, making it no surprise straws have been found to be the seventh most common item polluting beaches worldwide.

For those who relish a straw in their drinks, this bill still allows an exemption for compostable or reusable straws, while requiring that the plastic variation be served on-request only in full-service restaurants. This will reduce the number of plastic straws given out to customers who didn't want or need them and help curtail the negative impacts straws have on the environment.
