California Senate Bill
1383, which took effect
January 1, 2022, created
state-wide goals to
reduce greenhouse gas
emissions by limiting
organic waste, such as
food, from being
disposed of in landfills.
Landfills are the third
largest producers of
methane in California,
responsible for 20% of
the state's methane
emissions.

SB 1383 aims to decrease the amount of organic waste going to the landfill and increase the recovery of edible food to not only fight the production of greenhouse gases, but feed people and save money! Be sure your business is working on continued and increased usage of the green compost carts/bins



The City of Palo Alto is amending its existing Disposable Foodware Ordinance, Palo Alto Municipal Code Chapter 5.30, to better meet California Assembly Bill 1276 requirements for single-use disposable foodware. These requirements help reduce unnecessary waste and litter, protect local watersheds and oceans, and encourage Zero Waste.

Currently required in Palo Alto:

- All disposable utensils, straws, stirrers, drink plugs, and other small foodware provided must be reusable or compostable.
- Single-use disposable foodware accessories must be provided upon request or via a self-serve station.

Beginning June 1, 2022:

 Foodware or condiments cannot be bundled or packaged together. This eliminates the extra waste created when providing



SPRING CLEANING TIPS

Spring is the perfect season to organize and clear out the clutter throughout your business or organization.
Consider the following tips while spring cleaning:

- Create a designated area for supplies.
 Empty out your junk drawers and gather the extra office supplies in one location for staff to have access to to avoid over purchasing supplies.
- Shred old documents and be sure to recycle them! Place your shredded paper in a clear plastic bag so it's contained and then place that bag in your blue recycle bin.
- Donate reusable items! Explore options such as FreeCycle, Nextdoor, Craigslist,

and if you are a food generating business you, are following the new food recovery regulations.

- customers with a spoon and a knife when they only needed a fork.
- Third-party delivery platforms and restaurants must list individual foodware items and condiments in their menu for customers to "opt-in" for online orders.
- Condiments must only be provided upon request or via a self-serve station or refillable dispenser, except at drive-thru windows where employees may ask the customers' preferences.
